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


Council & Committee Meetings

It's time to exercise the fire hydrants

The Village will be conducting its annual hydrant flushing program during July. It is currently anticipated that this work will be performed on July 21 and 22.

All 85 of the Village's hydrants are flushed once a

year to help clear the water lines of particulates that may build up over time. Crews also check the hydrants and valves for any operational issues which need to be addressed in order



to keep the hydrants in good working order.

Residents may notice a brownish tint to their water after the hydrants in their neighborhood have been flushed. If so, run the water through a tap for a few minutes and it should clear up. Residents may also want to run their washer through a rinse cycle once before doing laundry.

Mosquito Update



Representatives from the county health department made a brief presentation at the June village council meeting about mosquitoes, various viruses, and control methods.

Most notably in the news these days is the Zika virus. There are a couple species of mosquitoes that occur in Ohio that have the potential of carrying and spreading the Zika virus. However, no infected specimens have been found in this state so far.

The best protection from mosquito bites is to:

- ✓ Empty or remove items that hold stagnant water around your yard or surroundings.
- ✓ Treat standing water that cannot be removed with larvicide to kill mosquito larvae.
- ✓ Check and repair window screens around your home.
- ✓ Minimize your outdoor activity in areas when and where adult mosquitoes are flying.
- ✓ When outdoors, wear clothing that covers your skin.
- ✓ Use an EPA-registered insect repellant and carefully follow the label instructions.

Reminders from Waste Management

- Trash to be removed is to be placed at the curbside no sooner than the evening before the scheduled collection day (which is Thursdays in Bremen).
- ► Bed mattresses must be completely wrapped and sealed in plastic.



► Upholstered furniture must be completely wrapped and sealed in plastic.



Carpeting/padding roles are to be individually tied and be no longer than 4 feet in length.



Plastic wrapping materials and packing tape can be purchased at hardware stores and some department stores.

Property Maintenance Problems

Village leaders and most of the village residents feel that two major obstacles in protecting harmony among neighbors and the historical and aesthetic charm of the community are the lack of adherence to zoning and property maintenance codes.

Neighbors, although they may not be vocal, do not want overgrown vegetation, junk cars, old furniture, construction materials and similar items in the yard next to their well-kept lawn and home. Village leaders do not want an unsightly property keeping future developers or investors from locating here. To that end, we all need to take it upon ourselves to clean up our property and/or advise the village of violations.

The Bremen Zoning Code and Property Maintenance Code can be found on the village website, <u>www.BremenVillage.com</u>.

The most common violations being seen are:

- 1) High Grass (Property Maint. Code, .05F)
- 2) Trash & Debris (Property Maint. Code, .05B)
- 3) Junk Vehicles (Property Maint. Code, .05E)
- 4) Swimming Pools (Zoning Code, 22.02)
- 5) Fences (Zoning Code, 22.03)
- 6) Accessory Buildings (Zoning Code, 22.01)
- 7) No Permit obtained (Zoning Code, 4.01)

These are just the most frequent violations. There are many more that you need to be aware of. Please review the codes or call the Zoning Inspector with questions. "I didn't know" is not an excuse for your responsibilities.

Other things you may not know:

- A permit is needed for construction or structural alteration of any building, including accessory buildings.
- Any time you occupy or use vacant land.
- Change in use of an existing building.
- Change in use of a non-conforming (grandfathered) building or structure.
- You can appeal any decision of the Zoning Inspector to the Zoning Commission.
- A zoning permit is void if it is issued upon a false statement.
- Failure to obtain a Zoning Permit shall be deemed a Violation and punishable under Section 7.02.04 of the Code.

Village officials and the zoning inspector realize that most violations are due to misinformation and/or lack of knowledge about the zoning and maintenance code. If you do not want to take the time to read the code, call the inspector at 740-652-5106 and he will be glad to help. The Village does not want to fine and punish residents. Common sense is the best way to avoid that. However, violators will be fined after proper notification has been given. Let's eliminate that need and follow the rules.

Control Your Grass Clippings

As you mow your lawn this season, remember to not leave your grass clippings in the street. Otherwise we can end up with clogged storm drains and time consuming and costly cleanout projects. This is the same as littering.



Know What's Below

When planning outdoor home improvement projects, remember that everyone who is going to dig or drive a post into the ground – including homeowners and contractors – must contact the Ohio Utilities Protection Service (OUPS) at least 48 hours, but not more than 10 working days (excluding weekends and legal holidays), before beginning any digging on their property. By calling OUPS at 8-1-1 or 1-800-362-2764, they will coordinate with local utilities to have underground lines marked at no charge to you.
